Former Reporter Writes From a 'Tropical (Censored)'

Son of Late Star Associate Editor Lauds Treatment of Soldiers Abroad

The following excerpts have been taken from a letter written by Newbold Noyes, Jr., son of the late Newbold Noyes, associate editor of The Star, from a "tropical (censored)." Prior to his entering the armed forces, Mr. Noyes was a reporter for The Star.

"Here I am at my first post of call. We have had a very pleasant, relatively quiet trip so far, with only a few 'false alarms' for excitement. I am in fine health and spirits, and am acquiring a sunburn as well as a beard. War is a tough proposition.

"Having spent a few days just bumming around this place, my impressions are these:

"One of the hardest things for the folks back home to realize and believe is that the boys in the American armed forces, when they leave their native soil, suddenly find themselves the favorite god-children of an Uncle Sam whose benevolence is almost too good to be true.

"You have to see it to believe it, and that is just what I have done. "The name of this place must be regarded as a military secret. It might properly be called, however, a tropical (censored). It is a long way from Washington.

"General conditions here are deplorable. There is a food shortage, a milk drought, and an epidemic of syphilis. But Johnny Doughboy—the natives call him 'Joe'—brings his Newbold Noyes, Jr., environment with him when he comes here. His life is not the life of this place.

"The army food here is better by far than the food in the finest hotel in the place. Anybody who can worm his way into an Army mess
